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Director's Message



This past year marked my first full year in Columbus as executive director of the Wexner Center, and it has been a joy getting to know my new home. I've been grateful to find a welcoming community, in the local arts scene, with my fellow arts and community leaders, and on campus. I spent the last year learning more about Ohio State's campus and students, considering how the Wex can become a more integral part of campus life and better serve our student population. It has been a year of listening, learning, and laying the groundwork for what's ahead.

We were privileged this year to welcome exceptional new talent to the center. Together this talented team has created a transformative vision and strategy for the Wexner Center reflective of the shifting the global arts landscape. Now woven into the fabric of the organization, this vision has cleared a path to advance our new brand strategy initiative in 2025.

We built national and international visibility for our unique, interdisciplinary programming, with features in *ArtReview* and *ARTnews*, among others. We launched a partnership with Columbus Arena Sports and Entertainment (CASE), attracting new audiences from around the state, many visiting the center for the first time.

We presented remarkable exhibitions and related programs featuring Wexner Center Artist Residency Award projects from Jonas N.T. Becker and Tanya Lukin Linklater, Wexner Center–commissioned projects from A.K. Burns and Sahar Khoury, and work by 2024 Guggenheim Fellow Harold Mendez.

We expanded our reach of our visual arts programming with Outpost Office, commissioning colorful, interactive, outdoor sculptures that activated spaces outside of the center and invited our campus community to engage with art in new ways.

DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Our performing arts season was equally dynamic, featuring Artist Residency Award—supported works including Tere O' Connor's *Rivulets* and the Ohio premiere of Ain Gordon and Josh Quillen's *Relics and Their Humans*. A new campus partnership with Ohio State's Office of Academic Affairs brought powerful musical acts Blind Boys of Alabama, Art Ensemble of Chicago, and Nathalie Joachim to our stages.

Our film/video program thrived, hosting over 100 filmmakers and industry professionals and growing our film audience 70 percent over the prior year. Audience-favorite festivals Unorthodocs and Cinema Revival returned, joined by our highly successful summer film series, Retrospective: Dario Argento. Unorthodocs provided the opportunity for multiple up-and-coming documentary filmmakers to introduce their films to a captive audience. During Cinema Revival we were proud to host the world restoration premiere of Charles Burnett's *The Annihilation of Fish*, starring the late James Earl Jones.

Our Film/Video Studio supported 25 filmmakers with projects premiering everywhere from Switzerland's Visions du Reél Festival to the Whitney Biennial.

The Learning & Public Practice department broadened its offerings, introducing two new curatorial roles and bringing hands-on art making to the Linden, Weiland Park, and the South Side neighborhoods of Columbus with expanded Community Studio programs.

Closing out the year I was honored to represent the Wexner Center at the Venice Biennale, while I served as curator for *Kapwani Kiwanga: Trinket* for the Canada Pavilion. Kiwanga was simultaneously featured at the center with a stunning piece in *Sarah Maldoror: Tricontinental Cinema*. During the biennale, Learning & Public Practice held an illuminating two-day symposium developed with the National Gallery of Canada at Ocean Space in Venice, another first for the center.

Throughout the year the Wexner Center lived up to its mission and promise to serve as a forum for dialogue, not only connecting artists and audiences but inviting them to engage in the vital issues of our time. We explored feminism and activism, honoring pioneers like Sarah Maldoror who confronted legacies of colonialism and showcasing contemporary artists who

explore these issues, including Maya Mihindou and Kapwani Kiwanga. We offered audiences a poignant look at how art can serve as a lifeline for incarcerated individuals through our premiere screening of the Oscar-nominated film Sing Sing.

Above all, this year we celebrated the importance of joy, community, and belonging—inviting our audiences and members to vibrant opening celebrations, performances, talks, and films, and welcoming new audiences to discover what contemporary art means to them. As The Ohio State University's multidisciplinary center for contemporary art, it is our privilege to share emerging arts and culture with our campuses, with Columbus, and indeed with the world.

Summary of Success

In 2023–24 the Wexner Center for the Arts presented 17 exhibitions and 27 performances, screened 147 films, and offered **343** learning programs. We presented or commissioned 8 projects through our Artist Residency Award program and supported **25** filmmakers through our Film/Video Studio. In total we welcomed **30,807** visitors to our building through our programs and in partnership with Columbus Area Sports and Entertainment welcomed **91,302** people to Mershon Auditorium. During the fiscal year the Wexner Center engaged with 139,438 fans and followers on Facebook and Instagram, provided information to 399,378 visitors to wexarts.org, and delivered 1,314,885 emails. We sent program materials to 88,980 households through the mail and distributed **84,845** pieces in the local community. We reached 236,016 locally, nationally, and internationally and received **458,184,000** impressions through earned media* and reached **712,641** students, faculty, and visitors on campus and online. We engaged 1,021 members, 1,112 donors, and 38 volunteers, and all of this was possible through their support—and yours.

Featured artist **Sarah Maldoror** (1929–2020) was honored in the 35th Saõ Paulo Biennial.


Graffiti artist **Futura**, a highlight of the 2022 exhibition To Begin, Again: A Prehistory of the Wex, 1968–89, was featured in the retrospective FUTURA2000: BREAKING OUT at University at Buffalo Art Galleries.

Artist Residency Award recipient **Sa'dia Rehman**'s 2023 exhibition at the Wexner Center toured to the Patricia & Phillip Frost Art Museum at Florida International University, Miami. Rehman and her exhibition was featured on WOSU's Emmy award-winning show *Broad & High*.

2023 exhibiting artist **Harold Mendez** was announced as a 2024 Guggenheim Fellow.

In June the Wexner Center and National Gallery of Canada presented *Kapwani Kiwanga: Trinket* at the 2024 Venice Biennale Arte. Curated by Wexner Center Executive Director Gaëtane Verna, the Canada Pavilion exhibition was accompanied by the two-day symposium *A Coincidence of Wants, the Shape of Value*, presented at Venice's Ocean Space. Kiwanga's work was showcased at the Wexner Center in *Sarah Maldoror: Tricontinental Cinema*.





The Wexner Center awarded its first Film/Video Residency Prize to animator Vitória Cribb in 2023 at the 22nd Videobrasil Biennial in São Paulo. The special prize includes \$10,000, a residency in the Film/Video Studio, and support for travel to Columbus.

Supported by the Wexner Center's Film/Video Studio, Leslie Tai's How to Have an American Baby (2023) was broadcast on POV on PBS and featured in Filmmaker Magazine. Of her experience at the Wex Tai said, "Truly I cannot express how meaningful that opportunity was and how helpful the feedback has been."

Supported by the Wexner Center's Film/Video Studio, **Alison O'Daniel**'s film *The Tuba Thieves* (2023) was featured as a *New York Times* Critic's Pick. After working on the film here in 2013, O'Daniel returned to the Wex to screen *The Tuba Thieves* in October.

In 2024, the Wexner Center's Learning & Public Practice team expanded its **Community Studios** initiative to provide informal art-making experiences in Columbus's Linden, Weinland Park, South Side, and Northland neighborhoods, as well as at the Cultural Arts Center in downtown Columbus. The team piloted programs with adults over 50 and Community Refugee and Immigration Services populations. In total LPP provided over 80 studio sessions and engaged over 3,000 people through Community Studios, giving away 546 free art supply kits to participants.

In 2023–24, Learning & Public Practice continued its artist residency program partnership with **Sanctuary Night**, a center for vulnerable women in Franklinton. As Sanctuary Night Executive Director and Cofounder Hanna Estabrook said in an interview with *Matter News*, "I think what has ended up being really the highest value is that we've had these incredible artists who have been just really present in their own bodies in our space, creating art in front of people... and we get to bear witness to that."












2023–24 Exhibitions



The 2023–24 exhibitions program featured four Wexner Center-originated presentations in our galleries and two highly regarded touring shows, furthering our commitment to bring international contemporary art to Columbus and the Ohio State campus.

In autumn 2023, the Wexner Center presented three exhibitions with an emphasis on the intersections of food and cross-cultural identity. Curated by former Head of Exhibitions Kelly Kivland, *Harold Mendez: one way to transform and two and three* was the artist's largest exhibition to date. Titled after a poem by Canisia Lubrin, the exhibition continued Mendez's exploration of the historical narratives that have shaped the Americas by reflecting on familial memories and personal stories. Mendez's first foray into ceramics was realized through partnerships with Cerámica Suro in Guadalajara, Mexico, and the Center for Contemporary Ceramics at California State University, Long Beach, and

included the Wexner Center-commissioned *Mundos*, a grouping of ceramic forms that resemble cloth bundles used to carry personal belongings.

Organized by MoMA PSI, New York, and curated on-site by former Associate Curator of Exhibitions Danny Marcus, *Jumana Manna: Break, Take, Erase, Tally* brought together nearly 20 works and presented Manna's films *Foragers* (2022) and *Wild Relatives* (2018) in conversation with a new installation of sculptures resembling *khabyas*, or vessels for storing grain. The sculptures and their accompanying grids in the gallery echoed the grid pattern of the Wexner Center's architecture, engaging the role of museums as sites of preservation and control.

Curated by former Curator of Exhibitions Lucy I. Zimmerman, Sahar Khoury: Umm was inspired by the iconic Egyptian singer Umm Kulthum and drew on familial and global histories, timekeeping, and memory's ever-evolving form in response to the present. In the exhibition, a showcase for Khoury's off-kilter sculptures, viewers encountered a kebab wind chime, a neon night-light holding Palestinian olive oil, and a 20-foot-tall radio tower. The exhibition also featured new tile plinths, also realized through a partnership with Cerámica Suro. The night-light was made in collaboration with Visiting Assistant Professor David King and students studying glass fabrication in Ohio State's Department of Art. The exhibition was punctuated by an original score by multidisciplinary artists Esra Canoğulları (8ULENTINA) and Lara Sarkissian.

Outpost Office, an experimental practice led by Ohio State Knowlton School associate professors Ashley Bigham and Erik Herrmann, began a multiphase presentation of new work in August 2023. The first phase, titled *Drawing Fields No. 7*, featured a GPS-controlled robot that painted colorful, curvilinear lines on the center's front lawn. The second phase, *Color Block No. 2*, which launched in November 2023, featured four large-scale pieces of modular furniture placed in and around the center to create new sites for collaboration, socializing, and informal learning.

In spring 2024, the Wexner Center partnered with Palais de Tokyo to present *Sarah Maldoror*: *Tricontinental Cinema*. The traveling exhibition was dedicated to Maldoror, a pivotal figure in African cinema, and explored cross-disciplinary connections as well as films and ephemera spanning her more than 40-year career. The exhibition was enlivened by works by contemporary artists including Mel Edwards, Wifredo Lam, Ana Mercedes Hoyos, Mathieu Kleyebe Abonnenc, Soñ Gweha, Kapwani Kiwanga, and Maya Mihindou, whose centercommissioned mural spanned each of the galleries.

Investigating connections between the environment, economics, class, and culture, summer 2024 featured the work of two Wexner Center Artist Residency Award recipients in their largest museum exhibitions to date. *Jonas N.T. Becker: A Hole is not a Void* surveyed works from 2009 to the present that address themes of land, labor, inequity, and environmental injustice. Among the works presented were Becker's Wexner Center–commissioned coal sculptures and Scenes from *Class Struggle*, made with support from the center's Film/Video Studio.

Tanya Lukin Linklater's Inner blades of grass (soft) inner blades of grass (cured) inner blades of grass (bruised by the weather) explored the artist's multidisciplinary practice over the past decade and featured a center-commissioned project informed by her visit to Ohio's Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks. During the exhibition's opening moments, visitors were invited to experience a series of improvisational open rehearsals with dance artists presented in relation to Structure of Sustenance Three (2024) in the galleries; the closing was marked by a vibrant gathering of Indigenous artists, musicians, poets, and performers.

Anna Tsouhlarakis: The Native Guide Project: Columbus

FEBRUARY 11-DECEMBER 30, 2023

Reframing the discourse around Native American identity, this Wex-commissioned project by artist of Navajo, Creek, and Greek descent Anna Tsouhlarakis focused on the forced migration of Indigenous peoples—including in Central Ohio. The multilayered commission built on Tsouhlarakis's The Native Guide Project (2019-present), which deploys phrases such as "I LIKE HOW YOU SEE NATIVE AMERICANS AS YOUR INTELLECTUAL EQUAL" in public venues. The work for the Wexner Center engaged the center's interior and exterior spaces, as well as sites around Columbus through a partnership with Orange Barrel Media.

Cadine Navarro Seed Songs for a New Earth (2023)

MAY 12-AUGUST 15, 2023 PRESENTED IN THE BOX

The culmination of Cadine Navarro's year-long Wexner Center residency, this video work was an expansion of her project It Sounds Like Love (2019), which translated the sounds created by nine Ohio-native prairie seeds into etched-glass light boxes embedded within an arrangement of Japanese tatami mats. The work was on view at the Grange Insurance Audubon Center near downtown Columbus. Her video in The Box, which offered a window into the process of making It Sounds Like Love, was also accompanied by tatami mats and a single light box.




Illya Mousavijad Between a Lost Home and a Losing Destination (2020–22)

AUGUST 24-OCTOBER 31, 2023 PRESENTED IN THE BOX

Inspired by the magic carpet story from the folk tale collection *One Thousand and One Nights*, this animation explores exile and migration in the Iranian diaspora. Born and raised in Iran, Illya Mousavijad used computer-generated animation techniques for this work to meticulously render items from his home country, placing images of dishes, glassware, fruits, and food on top of moving rugs. The surreal video highlights how inaccessible the artist's memories are from his current location in the United States and the constraints faced by family and friends in Iran.

Sahar Khoury: Umm

AUGUST 25-DECEMBER 30, 2023

The artist's largest exhibition to date, Sahar Khoury: Umm showcased new Wex-commissioned sculptures and installations that reference familial and global histories, timekeeping, and memory. Reflecting her training as an anthropologist, Khoury's works incorporate a wide range of techniques and media, from cast-off materials to sculptures crafted to resemble food and other commonplace objects. A word for mother in Arabic, Umm also refers to the iconic Egyptian singer Umm Kulthum, whose influence was honored with a Wex-commissioned score by Esra Canoğulları and Lara Sarkissian broadcast in the galleries.

Jumana Manna: Break, Take, Erase, Tally

AUGUST 25-DECEMBER 30, 2023

Jumana Manna's first major museum exhibition in the US charted her practice through nearly 20 works, including sculptures, installations, and films. Using a range of narrative and formal methods, Manna visualizes how industrial agriculture, government control, and cultural traditions shape our environment and the ways we sustain ourselves. Manna's documentaries Foragers (2022) and Wild Relatives (2018), which trace the flow of human and plant life across political and legal boundaries, screened for free in our galleries and Film/Video Theater.

Harold Mendez: one way to transform and two and three

AUGUST 25-DECEMBER 30, 2023

Featuring several Wex-commissioned projects, Harold Mendez's largest exhibition to date assembled over 30 recent works that focus on historical and personal narratives as well as states of flux and transformation. As a first-generation American of Mexican and Colombian descent, Mendez's experience of being raised in multiple places informed the carefully researched works on view, which included a collection of new sculptures, large-scale mixed-media works, assemblages, and his first works in volcanic stone and ceramic.

Unfolding in several phases, Wex-commissioned projects by Columbus-based practice Outpost Office, led by Ohio State's Ashley Bigham and Erik Herrmann, invited visitors to interact with the Wexner Center in unexpected ways. Drawing Fields No. 7 utilized a GPS-controlled robot to paint intricate and ephemeral line-based patterns on the center's lawn. Color Block No. 2 involved an incremental installation of colorful, large-scale furniture at various locations inside and outside the center. Both phases provided new spaces for socializing and informal learning while highlighting overlooked aspects of the Wexner Center's iconic building.

Tricontinental Cinema was the first largescale museum exhibition dedicated to Sarah Maldoror, a pioneer of African cinema. Through an immersive landscape of projections, photographs, poetry, and letters, the exhibition invited visitors to follow Maldoror's career, which spanned more than 45 revolutionary films; her involvement with Black liberation movements; and her connections with creative figures including Wifredo Lam and Aimé Césaire. Accompanied by talks and screenings, the exhibition also extended these conversations to the present with works by contemporary artists including Kapwani Kiwanga and Maya Mihindou.

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2023–24 Performing Arts



The 2023–24 performing arts season was a time of transition and change, with a focus on deepening community engagement and expanding partnerships with Ohio State faculty and students. As we approached our 35th anniversary season (2024–25), we reflected on a tenured history of holding space for the cultivation and presentation of performing arts disciplines. And looking forward to the next few years and beyond, we are thinking about how performance can be used as a vehicle to impact audiences, tell stories, and be a source of joy.



In partnership with Ohio State's Office of Academic Affairs, we were able to present two large-scale shows in Mershon Auditorium featuring Blind Boys of Alabama, in November 2023, and Art Ensemble of Chicago, in February 2024. Each group, prolific in their own right, drew new and diverse audiences to the Wexner Center.

Ohio State professor Kevin McClatchy's *Scrap Heap* immersed audiences in a Special Forces veteran's experience of transitioning from the United States military to civilian life. The response was two sold-out performances and significant community engagement from partners at Ohio State and the greater Columbus Veterans Affairs community.

We were proud to present the Midwest premiere of Tere O'Connor's *Rivulets*, a project that was supported by a Wexner Center Artist Residency Award and co-commissioned by the Wexner Center.

Like Leaves. Like Carrots., presented by Wexner Center virtual residency recipient James Dennen, brought together artificial intelligence and virtual reality technology with the incredible talents of dancer Brianna Rhodes, poet Michael "Blakk Sun" Powell, visual artist Christian Faur, and internationally renowned string quartet ETHEL.



Through our partnership with Ohio State's School of Music, ETHEL presented a masterclass, playing select pieces and engaging university students and faculty in a robust conversation about navigating a career in the performing arts.

Theater presentations including Aya Ogawa's *The Nosebleed*, Ain Gordon and Josh Quillen's *Relics and Their Humans*, *Descended*, and Anonymous Ensemble's *Llontop* all dove into the complexities of family relationships and histories.

Jeff Parker and The New Breed's sold-out jazz show brought fresh energy into the center's Performance Space with a mixture of new and returning patrons.

We are hopeful for continued growth and engagement with our audiences and community partners as we close out this year and look toward the next.

May 08, 2023-June 30, 2024 The second installment of James Dennen's virtual residency, Critical Theory 1 explored real-time collaboration in virtual reality through an interdisciplinary improvisation. Theater artist and director Dennen and choreographer and dancer Molly Shanahan were devising Critical Theory as a live performance piece when COVID-19 emerged. As the pandemic put a hold on performing in person, the work was rerouted and adapted for the virtual theater where Dennen's recent experiments (such as the Wexner Centersupported Anti-gravity Donuts) have taken shape. Scrap Heap July 27-28, 2023

In the multimedia theater piece Scrap Heap, Ohio State Associate Professor Kevin McClatchy portrays a US Army Special Forces veteran transitioning to civilian life. Inspired by a true story, the turbulent and darkly funny work surveys the costs of war through the eyes of one forgotten soldier while examining society's responsibility to welcome back our service members. Using spoken word, verbatim text, movement, and sonic immersion. McClatchy placed Wexner Center audiences at the center of the veteran's experience of armed conflict and its aftermath. Tere O'Connor

Rivulets

September 21-23, 2023

Artist Residency Award recipient Tere O'Connor continues his 40-year-long exploration of the human mind with the dance work Rivulets, which made its regional premiere at the Wex. Celebrating the unruly nature of consciousness and featuring a score composed by O'Connor himself, the Wex-supported piece attempts to jettison unison movement entirely to embrace a new kind of freedom; the New York Times called it a "masterly choreographic design." O'Connor engaged in a Q&A moderated by past Artist Residency Award recipient Abby Zbikowski and delivered a Diversities in Practice artist talk on September 19. Postperformance Q&A with Tere O'Connor on September 22. Midwest premiere. Artist Residency Award project. Co-commissioned by the Wexner Center for the Arts.



Pelada

September 26, 2023

Audiences moved their bodies and found inspiration at this Montreal-based duo's Wexner Center debut. Making a splash with Movimiento para cambio (movement for change), Stereogum's #1 electronic record of 2019, Pelada pairs Chris Vargas's fierce, socially conscious vocals in Spanish with producer Tobias Rochman's high-octane house beats. With lyrics that rail against government surveillance, the heteropatriarchy, and climate change, Pelada defies the status quo while delivering the goods for the dance floor—which they did for Wex audiences with passion.



TENGGER

October 5, 2023

Featuring couple itta and Margido and their son RAAI, TENGGER creates psychedelic, New Age music using harmonium, voice, toy instruments, and analogue synths and drum machines. Starting as a duo, in 2012 the group renamed themselves TENGGER—meaning unlimited expanse of sky in Mongolian—to mark the expansion of their family. Influenced by the teachings of Suzuki Shunryu, the minimalist mysticism of composer Terry Riley, and the rhythmic trance of Krautrock bands like Cluster, TENGGER's widescreen sound offered Wexner Center audiences a soothing sonic portrait of a life spent in transit. Ohio premiere. Free matinee performance for Juniper School on October 5.



Ioe Rainev

October 19, 2023

During the 2016 Eaux Claires festival, powwow singer Joe Rainey, an Ojibwe member of the Red Lake Nation, received a moment of inspiration. Reuben Crowfeather, a member of the Hunkpapa Lakota tribe and drum group Iron Boy, began to dance, in full traditional garb, to Minneapolis producer Andrew Broder's electronic beats. This compelling pairing inspired Rainey to collaborate with Broder on their critically acclaimed album Niineta. This performance at the Wex showcased that record's same powerful combination of Rainey's vocals, processed powwow samples, and Broder's exciting tracks.



El Khat

November 9, 2023

Led by multi-instrumentalist Eyal El Wahab, Tel Aviv-based group El Khat makes heartfelt folk music with love for a culture that has been brutally disenfranchised. Named after the addictive leaf that has been chewed socially in the Arab peninsula for over 600 years, El Khat's sound creates a similar euphoria with percussion, strings, and the band's own custom-built instruments. El Wahab and his band brought their contemporary perspective on Yemen's sonic past to the Wexner Center's Performance Space with their trademark skill and humanity. Ohio premiere.



Blind Boys of Alabama

November 15, 2023

For more than 80 years the Blind Boys of Alabama have enchanted music lovers worldwide with their powerful vocals and impassioned performances. The five-time Grammy winners continue to redefine gospel's boundaries by mixing in elements of soul. R&B, and rock and covering songs by Prince, Stevie Wonder, and Justin Vernon (Bon Iver), among others. At this performance organized in partnership with Ohio State's Office of Academic Affairs, audiences from campus and beyond enjoyed a remarkable evening of soulful, uplifting melodies from living legends of gospel music. Expanding on systems developed by Dennen while in residence at the Wexner Center, the world premiere of Like Leaves. Theater director Dennen and his award-winning collaborators staged their work in mixed realities (virtual and actual) and drew from content written and performed by mixed intelligences (both artificial and human). Interweaving these elements, the cutting-edge work poses a series of timely questions, including the value of human creativity and the need for person-to-person encounters. World premiere. Art Ensemble of Chicago

February 3, 2024

Formed in 1965, Art Ensemble of Chicago is celebrated for its still-vital take on jazz, which encompasses European art music and African folk styles as well as a flair for theatricality and social activism. Their avant-garde approach has attracted legions of fans, including exhibiting artist Sarah Maldoror, who invited them to score her first film, Monangambeee (1969). Led at this performance by founding members Roscoe Mitchell and Famoudou Don Moye and featuring spoken-word performances by Moor Mother, the group delivered a stunning set of their highly influential and groundbreaking music. This appearance followed the success of his ambitious live double album Mondays at the Enfield Tennis Academy (2022). Both that record and this performance showcased the singular improvisational skills of the artists at play.



Anonymous Ensemble

Llontop

April 4-6, 2024

Presented at the Wex in its local premiere, this multimedia performance set out to bridge divides between North and South America, honoring the people of the Andes. A three-part experience, Llontop began with an interactive installation featuring a display of Peruvian heirlooms, including pre-Columbian Moche pottery. An accompanying audio journey contextualized the poetry of Irma Alvarez-Ccoscco and the history of the Quechua people. These poems were sung and spoken alongside a "live film" performance with multiple camera feeds, projections, and a lush soundscape that was livestreamed for audiences online. Ohio premiere. 2023–24 Film/Video



Among the many highlights of the past year's film and video programs was the increase in our attendance by nearly 75% from the previous year. Our patrons are making it clear that they are excited to see movies on the big screen with fellow film lovers!





Our department is committed to supporting filmmakers and engaging with audiences. We do this by presenting their work in the best possible manner within our theater and by providing expert and sustained postproduction support to new projects in our studio. During the past fiscal year, we hosted more than 70 filmmakers and 30 film professionals to present work in our theater and supported an additional 24 more in our Film/Video Studio.

In 2023–24 we were proud to welcome such esteemed filmmakers as Brenda Chapman, the first woman to direct an animated feature in Hollywood with 1998's *The Prince of Egypt*; legendary Serbian documentarian Želimir Žilnik; and New Queer Cinema icon Gregg Araki, who introduced a new restoration of *Nowhere* (1997). All three of these filmmakers also made special class visits to engage with Ohio State students during their time here. We were also proud to





host the restoration world premiere of Charles Burnett's *The Annihilation of Fish* (1999) during our annual Cinema Revival festival. It was the first time Burnett had seen the film with an audience in nearly 25 years, and the evening was incredibly emotional for the filmmaker and audience alike.

In April, we hosted the world premiere of Family White Elephants, the first film by Columbus visual artist Mary Joe Bole, as part of the citywide Cinema Columbus festival. Bole was an inaugural recipient of an Ohio Humanities Film Fellows at the Wex award (a partnership now in its second year), and she received intensive, multiyear postproduction support from our Film/Video Studio to finish the project. Among the many other projects receiving studio support during the past year were Nellie Kluz's The Dells, which premiered at Switzerland's Visions du Réel festival; Columbus filmmaker Vera Brunner-Sung's Bitterroot, which premiered at the Tribeca Film Festival; Hao Zhou's Wouldn't Make It Any Other Way, which premiered at SXSW; and

Wexner Center Artist Residency Award recipient Jonas N.T. Becker's Scenes from *Class Struggle*, which premiered in the Wexner Center galleries in May as part of the exhibition *A Hole is not a Void*.

We continue to emphasize our support of regional filmmakers, both student filmmakers on campus as well as those across central Ohio. Sundance Film Festival programmer Mike Plante hosted a workshop for filmmakers that discussed distribution strategies for their short films. Oscar-winner Matt Derksen, head of rigging for Industrial Light & Magic, gave a presentation for students and area filmmakers on his CGI work for films such as The Hunger Games and the program Game of Thrones. Our annual Unorthodocs festival included filmmakers from South Africa, Croatia, Lebanon, and Puerto Rico and, as always, provided a full weekend of opportunities for area filmmakers to engage with our talented guests. Our annual presentation of Ohio State's Moving-Image Production Senior Showcase has become one of the most anticipated events of the spring, and for most of the student filmmakers it is their first opportunity to show their films in a professional setting with an audience of peers, family, and friends. Likewise, our 28th annual Ohio Shorts event, easily the state's longest-running program of its kind, offered a moment where regional filmmakers could gather, show their work in a professional atmosphere, and experience an evening of fellowship with artists from around the state.

It was an exciting and fulfilling year, and we are eager to share our next season of programs with you in the months ahead!



2023–24 Learning & Public Practice



Learning & Public Practice (LPP) at the Wexner Center for the Arts creates arts programming and constructs learning spaces that center experiences of public interaction, discussion, and art making. The department is made up of four program areas: Art & Resilience, Community Programs, Teaching and Learning, and Public Programs. Each year, LPP offers over 325 free programs that shape educational experiences with and for the public. LPP's programming involves deep work with practicing artists, educators, learners, partners, and participants across and beyond the region.

During the 2023–24 programming year, LPP engaged over 10,000 participants including K–12 learners and educators, students and faculty at The Ohio State University and from colleges and universities across the region and country, artists from around the region and the world, and a wide range of participants from across the state of Ohio and beyond.

This year, LPP's Community Studios programming, in partnership with City of Columbus's Recreation and Parks Department, offered a wide variety of free hands-on art-making studios available at sites across central Ohio. Community Studios have expanded to include new participant populations, new central Ohio locations, and an evolving range of artist educators and artistic offerings. These



studios offer a variety of hands-on art-making and arts-learning experiences to include after-school programs at Linden Community Center with elementary and middle school children; studio programming at Schiller Community Center for Columbus area seniors 55+; and in partnership with Community Refugee & Immigration Services (CRIS), multilingual programming for adults, youths, and LGBTQIA+ populations. In addition to these new sites and programming, the Wexner Center has partnered with the Columbus Cultural Arts Center (CAC) to offer free studios and engagement with artists from the Wex and CAC's community of artists and participants. Also new this year, LPP partnered with Ohio State's A. Sophie Rogers School for Early Learning at the Schoenbaum Family Center and locally based Replenish to offer programming for pre-K youths and families that includes art making, yoga, reading, and movement-based studio experiences.

Other highlights from the year include LPP's work with K–12 schools through our Expanded Classroom programming. Those offerings included hands-on learning with architects Ashley Bigham and Erik Herrmann of Outpost Office, serving 120 fourthgrade students and educators from Hilliard Crossing Elementary School; and an ongoing partnership with Columbus City Schools, working with K–12 students in the galleries and in the classroom as they participate in a wide range of arts experiences and explore career paths in the creative sectors. LPP also partnered with Waldorf K–8, The Juniper



School, and Ohio State's Institute for Korean Studies and Department of East Asian Languages and Literatures for a live performance for children and families with Seoul-based band TENGGER. Also, for youths, LPP partnered with Columbus City Schools Family Day and Pint Size Protestors, a local nonprofit, to invite and engage with children's book writer, artist, activist, and graphic designer Innosanto Nagara (*A is for Activism*) as a part of our Zoom: Family Film and Book Festival.

LPP wrapped up the 2023–24 program year sending two staff members to Venice, Italy. I traveled with Curator of Public Programs Emily Haidet to coorganize and participate in an international symposium envisioned in partnership with Wexner Center Executive Director and Canadian Pavilion curator Gaëtane Verna, artist Kapwani Kiwanga, and the National Gallery of Canada. Held at Venice's Ocean Space, the symposium was a learning component of Kapwani Kiwanga's installation *Trinket* at the Canada Pavilion as a part of the 2024 Venice Biennale. The symposium featured talks and moderated discussion highlighting the work of artists, scholars, educators, and practitioners from around the world.

The work of Learning & Public Practice demonstrates the Wexner Center for the Arts' ongoing commitment to collaborative community learning and engagement.

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


